ter, is entitled to a recount.

Schnack, a former Planning Board member who ran successfully for Town Council in 2005, was not optimistic about his prospects going into the recount.

"I don't think it'll change anything," he said.

Still, "it's only a 1.6-percent difference," he added.

According to the Board of Cansvasser's the last recount conducted on the island was in 2005 by then-candidate Sav Rebecchi.

Today's recount could also have implications for the race for town council president. Traditionally, the council president is determined by vote count. Council Vice President Julio DiGiando, who has served on the council for

the longest period and had been presumed to be in line to lead the next council, fell 18 votes short of the top slot. That distinction went to former Town Administrator Robert Sutton, a first-time council candidate, who won with 1,032 votes. Meanwhile, Councilor William Kelly, who placed third in the voting with a strong 932 votes also has been rumored to be interested in sitting in the council president's chair.

No matter what the outcome of today's recount is, or who wields the gavel over the next two years, one thing is certain: the next council will be comprised of three out of five incumbents. However, should Szepatowski's lead evaporate, the council would be wholly comprised of Democrats.

The recount is set for this afternoon, Thursday, at 2:30 p.m.

25 years ago

From the Newport Daily News, November 16, 1982

The Town Council has reached no decision on joining a state committee to plan the route of the connector road between the Jamestown and Newport Bridges.

From the Newport Daily News, November 17, 1982

The deadline for the town to apply for excess federal land at Beavertail has been extended to Jan. 15.

The School Board Advisory Committee presented three alternatives for roof repairs to the School Committee Tuesday night. ... Alternative 1 would cost about \$4.50 a square foot. Alternative 2, about \$4.90 a square foot and Alternative 3, \$1.50 a square foot. Alternatives 1 and 2 have a 20-year life expectancy; Alternative 3 would be good for about 5 years. Total costs range from \$65,000 to more than \$200,000.

15 years ago

From the Jamestown Press, November 12, 1992

Town officials will consider having two polling places on the island for elections in the future. ... The town now has only one polling place. Last Tuesday, 83 percent of the town's 3,618 registered voters went to to cast their ballots on eight voting machines at the Community Center. Voters on average spent two hours inside the building waiting to enter a booth, according to poll workers.

Work on the cross-island connector road went out to bid last Thursday and those bids received are expected to be opened Dec. 4.

Members of the newly created Senior Center Siting Committee were given the oath of office at Monday's Town Council meeting.

10 years ago

From the Jamestown Press, November 13, 1997

The Town Council Monday voted unanimously to establish a Highway Barn Committee to determine the site, size, basic layout, and maximum space needed for a new highway equipment garage.

Some 20 residents decided to take history into their own hands and agreed to form the Friends of the Conanicut Island Battery, a group organized specifically to restore and preserve the Conanicut Island Battery, a Revolutionary War fortification constructed in 1776.
