ford who is spending this week in Appalachia helping to build a home and shelter for a family, reconstructing a barn, rebuilding fences and accomplishing any other chores that need to be done. The 16-year-old is there with 14 other students from Bishop Hendricken who were chosen by their classmates. They are living in abject poverty, no hot water, no electricity, outhouses, and they "bathe" in a spring-fed pond that is 38 degrees. There are no phones or cell phone towers, no TVs or stereos, no restaurants. They are sleeping on the floor at a farm.

Chris's dad, also named Chris, said "When we went to the parents meeting on this and they put up on the screen in pictures what the week entailed, you could hear a pin drop. Many parents were stunned that this existed in the United States. The kids were not allowed to bring books, as the families they will be mixing with cannot read, nor were they allowed to even bring wristwatches, never mind iPods. The statistics on literacy, percentages of pregnancies under age 17, diseases . . . for this area of the United States are embarrassing for a country with the resources we have. It's a huge gut check for kids who want to whine about their current standing in life and an eye-opening challenge to what they can accomplish in life if they have the guts and mental toughness to change things for the better."
