John A. Murphy writes: "Mary Jane and I have recently returned from a visit to Normandy, and are still inspired by what we saw there.

"The D-Day invasion sites truly are sacred places, and will continue to have important meaning and lessons for future generations. In our opinion, in most instances the governments involved in the preservation of these sites, in the provision of interpretative materials, and in memorializing the sacrifices made there, have done a

superb job.

"This is particularly so of the areas under control of the American Battlefields Monuments Commission. We, like most visitors to these areas, found the cemeteries for American servicemen particularly moving. This is certainly due, in no small part, to the beauty of the presentation created by the Commission.

"One small point that we would bring to the Commission's attention: the allowance of smoking and cell phone use in the cemetery allows truly discordant notes to intrude. It only takes a few insensitive or ignorant visitors to spoil the occasion for the majority who wish to spend time quietly and

reverently."
