NK road race to benefit high school teams and scholarships

The 10th running of the NK5k road race and walk to benefit North Kingstown High School scholarships is scheduled for Saturday, Sept. 12, at 9:30 a.m. Race registration begins at 7:30 a.m. at the high school track and field.

The NK5k is open to everyone from serious runners to strolling

kids, and features a flat, speedy course with an Olympic-style finish onto the school track.

In addition to raising more than \$8,000 in scholarship money for the high school's students, the NK5k also provides funds for other school programs throughout North Kingstown, as well as the

high school boys' tennis and wrestling teams. This year, the NK5k will also help fund the school's swim team.

Entry fees are \$10 for NK students and \$18 online at needto-race.com.

Coast Guard to hold boating safety class in Jamestown

The U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary Flotilla 79 will hold a one-day boating class at the Jamestown Fire Dept. on Narragansett Avenue on Saturday, Aug. 22, from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

The course "About Boating Safely" is a state-approved boating class that qualifies participants to receive the state of Rhode Island boating card, which is required of anyone - regardless of age - to op-

erate a personal watercraft.

Anyone born after Jan. 1, 1986, is also required to have a R.I. Boating Card to operate a motor greater than 10 horsepower.

The course covers basic boating requirements, including federal and state regulations, required and recommended equipment, safe boat operation and handling, emergency situations and risk assessment. Both power boat and

sail boat topics are covered.

Cost is \$40 per person or \$70 for two family members. Textbook and lunch are included. Participants will also receive a U.S. Coast Guard auxiliary boating course card and a certificate of completion.

Jamestown will host open water rowing and paddling race

Hundreds of the world's best open water rowers and paddlers will descend on Mackerel Cove on Saturday, Aug. 29, to compete in a grueling self-propelled race around the island. The racers will complete a difficult 15.5-mile counter revolution around the island ending at Fort Getty.

This is a new event for Jamestown, but it promises to attract many big names in rowing as it will also be the site of this year's prestigious North American Open Water Rowing Championship.

"Jamestown welcomed us with open arms. The course is incredible, one of the best in North America for what we need," said Dan Gorriaran of the Narragansett Boat Club in Providence, one of the race organizers.

Spectators are invited, and can see the mass start at Mackerel Cove at 9 a.m., or view the race from Fort Wetherill or downtown Jamestown (East Ferry town beach). The best vantage point for the finish will be Ft. Getty.

"The foremost concern for the

race organizers is safety, and the town of Jamestown has pulled out all the stops to make this a first class event that protects the safety of participants," Gorriaran said.
